



To co-incide with the 'Thy Kingdom Come' initiative organised by the Church of England we are running a 6 week study course following the Pilgrim material on the Lord's Prayer. The Pilgrim courses are designed to create a place where people can explore the Christian faith together. *(See over for course outline)*

The sessions will be held on Saturday mornings:

12 May, 19 May, 2 June, 9 June, 16 June, 23 June

starting at **9.15** and finishing by **11am** at the very latest.

All sessions will be held in the **Church Room at Grendon.**

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The Lord's Prayer is one of the greatest Christian treasures. This course focuses on that well known form of worship to explore prayer and reveal more about what God is like. Study the significance of the familiar words we say so often and their relevance to our own lives.

Session One: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name

Explores the Christian belief that Jesus invites us into a new relationship with God as our Father through prayer.

Session Two: Your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven

Unpacks the idea of the kingdom of God, which is central to Jesus' teaching and being a Christian disciple.

Session Three: Give us today our daily bread

How does God feed his people, and what does it mean to pray the words: 'Give us this day our daily bread'?

Session Four: Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us

Looks at the central place of forgiveness in the Christian life: both receiving God's forgiveness and forgiving others.

Session Five: Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil

Considers our strengths and weaknesses, exploring this plea to God for help and protection.

Session Six: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen

How praise and worship begins and ends Christian prayer, and draws everything together.
